
## the President

It's been a hectic six months, but we are happy to say our new building is up, and the dedication and ribbon cutting



The ceremonies were held in conjunction with our annual Postcard Show and Open House. The weather cooperated beautifully, and city officials from Wildwood, North Wildwood and West Wildwood were on hand to wish us well and present their proclamations. What a great day!

Now that we have more room, Al Brannen, one of our directors, has been busy going through boxes that have been stored in our back room. He has come upon some really neat treasurers. We have the original ledger of the first Italian Social Club which eventually became the Sons of Italy. The first entry is March, 1932, and lists most of the Italian names of the island at that time. We also found the corporate seal of the Italian Social Club from 1922. These are now on display in our new addition. He also unearthed dozens and dozens of grade school photos from Wildwood and Andrews Avenue schools. They were taken between 1954 and 1957 and have all been cataloged and put in the school folders. He even came across a 1918 photo of the late "Reds" Maxwell, a long-time Wildwood Commissioner in his WW I Army uniform, which we

Our collection of memorabilia and artifacts coninues to grow. Lou Suppa, a retired Wildwood policeman, brought in a collection of photos from the police department going back to 1953. Scott Hand brought in

a photo of the late Harold Sherwood and an Army WAC selling WW II war bonds. There were also photos of Five Mile Beach Buses, and Grand Prix auto racing at 4600 Ocean Avenue. Chris White gave us a photo of the Pacific Hotel in 1903 that stood at Andrews and Pacific Avenue A 1946 and 1954 Polk Directory was given to us by **Joe Gerety.** They are an invaluable source of information for us. The Vinci Family gave us a framed Salvation Times North Wildwood political newspaper from 1927. One great find came from **Bob McLaughlin**. It is the store safe belonging to R. W. Do vou remember Marsh's Bakery on the corner of Poplar and New York Avenues? This question was posed to a number of residents and former residents and most were unanimous in their praise of the "delicious cinnamon buns and butter cake."

**Bob Frederick** from Wildwood Crest said he remembered riding by the store on his bike and "smelling the great aromas coming from the bakery." Bob **Hoffnagle** of Erma, responded with "Do I remember Marsh's Bakery? Yep! Like it was vesterday." Bob said he grew up in West Wildwood where his father had a bakery. After his dad passed away, the family moved to Wildwood. Bob's route home would walk him by Marsh's Bakery and the smells of baking were a treat. He said it was the custom in those days to stop at the local bakeries for buns for breakfast after going to church. Bob was born in West Wildwood in 1928 and he concluded with "I wouldn't trade my time growing up in Wildwood for all the tea in China!"

Chris Taglialatela of North Wildwood said "Hot Bake! Those are the two most remembered words from the sixties. From 7:00 AM to 7:00 PM people lined up to get the most luscious cinnamon buns with raisins and nuts, cinnamon and sugar twists, German butter cake and more. My salivary glands are working overtime just thinking of the good old days." **Jack Beaver** who now resides in Pottstown, PA, said "I remember Marsh's very well." He recalled another favorite called "snowflake rolls" and the inflationary price of 14 cents for a loaf of bread which his grandmother balked at paying. He said, "I don't know if this is of much help to you, however, I had fun reminiscing.'

Pat Shea Lampi of Tabernacle. NJ said she remembers "it being at the end of New York Avenue, but more importantly, they had the very, very best cinnamon buns ever! To date, I have never tasted any better. Yum, yum, yum!!!!" **Don Springer** of North Cape May said "It is not possible to forget the hot cross buns." Since they had no car, it was his job to go to Marsh's, "making the purchase and then running as fast as my feet would carry me from Marsh's to Montgomery Avenue." Sometimes he stayed at his friend Earl Moore's house, and Earl's parents would wake them up for hot cross buns. Don said "As I sit here at my trusty computer, I can almost smell those buns again."

Fred Grosse of Cape May Court House lived on the 100 West Block of 25th Street and he said it was the "greatest place to walk to for cinnamon buns and those great German recipes." Inge Friesenborg Laine of Rio Grande said her "memories included the 7 o'clock bake. Luther League (a youth group) met at Holy Trinity Lutheran Church on Sunday or Monday evenings. It was always one person's job to get down to the bakery shortly after the 7:00 PM baking to purchase the cinnamon twists for refreshments after the meeting. Nothing better than a fresh doughnut or twist from Marsh's!"

Bob Patterson of the Crest said "the first thing that comes to my mind is their delicious butter cake; best in the world and the second thing is their delicious cinnamon buns. It was especially nice to drive by and smell them baking." Mary Carlson of North Wildwood was brief but said "I think that Marsh's is the place that sold the delicious butter cake."

Charles Carr of North Wildwood responded with "Every Sunday morning after the 7:30 service at the old St. Simeon's on Maple Avenue, we would drive over to Marsh's to buy fresh glazed doughnuts for our breakfast before returning to church at 10:30 AM for Sunday School. JoAnn Tinney Rosell from Cape May: "Yes, Marsh's Bakery! After church on Sundays we would get the butter cake. It was the best in the world and I haven't had one as good since."

From Ocean View, Pat Schramm Flanagan wrote "Oh yea, Marsh's Bakery! I can smell it now. I lived on Glenwood Avenue just off of Park Boulevard and you could smell it all the way over there. As soon as we got the aroma, we would walk over to the bakery and buy the fresh made buns. Before we got home with them, we were eating them out of the pack. The smell of Marsh's baking and the salt air were home town Wildwood to us." Charlotte "Missie" Taylor, whose family owned Taylor's Photo Shop and is presently living in North Cape May, remembered the owner Percy Marsh and his two very large Great Dane dogs. She also said "I liked their butter cake and the hot cinnamon buns in the evening-yum!!"

Don Grosse from Edgewater, FL, said "they had the best cinnamon buns in Wildwood. My mom and dad used to go there around midnight and to the back door where they would sell them fresh-baked hot cinnamon buns."

Rose Iacono Mattera of North Wildwood remembered "the low ceiling and the taste of their famous butter cakes." Judy Miles Carr from the Crest used to live on W. Juniper Ave and remembers "the long lines that would form for the bakings."

. . . and so here are just some of the replies received about a local establishment that is just a memory, but what a memory! Thank you all for responding. A. Vinci, Editor
