
As president of the Wildwood Historical Society, I am pleased to announce our 2008 Building Fund Cam-

# **Curator's Corner**

Winter has come and gone, and we continue to catalog the many artifacts that are presented to us. Our volunteer, **Inge Friesenborg**, has cataloged dozens of items from the J. Elwood and Marie Chester Estate and the Curtis Miller collection. She has also given us a wealth of

photos from her family files documenting the early fishing industry that the Wildwoods enjoyed during the 30s and 40s.

We are finding great photos from the John Fulginiti Negatives Collection. Among them are Holidays Restaurant on the Boardwalk; 7 Seas Café taken in the late 40s or early 50s, Johnson's Restaurant at Taylor and Pacific in the 1940s, Murphy's 5 & 10 taken in March, 1951, and the Woolworth Building under construction in 1953. For Wildwood Catholic we received a 1974 class ring from Maureen Dole and a Wildwood Catholic jacket from **Joanne Vinci**. **Harold Jansen** gave us a button commemorating the opening of the George Redding Bridge in 1950. Jerry MacDonald continues to generously share with us his old trolley photos. One is a parade of trolleys on Old New Jersey Avenue and the other is trolley #36 parked on Spruce Avenue at Moore's Inlet. For the trolley enthusiast these can be see in our Five Mile Beach Electric Railway book. From the Karayangelas Family, we have a photo of the opening of the Apollo Restaurant at Andrews and New Jersey Avenues in 1971. Wilhemina Pohl gave us photos of Mr. and Mrs. Spatz of Spatz Pharmacy. Inge was also able to unearth items such as a 1977 Wheaton Agency calender, a Lea & Nuss calendar, a Clarke Motors wall thermometer and the list goes on and on. You must come in to see us and you, too, will be amazed at what we have.

The above photo was taken in September, 1945, from the Murphy building at Wildwood and Pacific Avenues. The Marine Bank building is still standing, but is now the Crest Savings Bank. The buildings on the right-hand side were razed during the late 1960s urban renewal project The photo was part of a box of negatives belonging to John Fulginiti and given to the museum years ago. # Planes, Trains and Automobiles Bring Thousands of Tourists

In 1925, engineers dredged Sunset lake on the bay side of Wildwood Crest and used the spoils to fill in Turtle Gut, thus joining Two Mile Beach to the rest of the island. Trains were soon running to the tip of the island, despite the protestations of many Crest residents. Even after several great summers when many businesses set records—including a Labor Weekend in 1927, when receipts topped a million dollars — the Reading and Pennsylvania Railroads started to talk about consolidation to eliminate duplication of services. It took years to reach an agreement, but in 1932, the Pennsylvania-Reading Seashore Line was serving the county.

By 1924, a new bridge across Grassy Sound that connected the northern end of the island with Ocean Drive improved driving conditions and infringed on the railroad's appeal with vacationers. In 1928, on a July weekend, 14,000 people

people arrived by train, but according to newspaper accounts, 25,000 cars brought another 100,000 visitors.

Convenient bus service with coaches leaving Philadelphia every 20 minutes was additional competition for the struggling railroad. Airline service at the county airport and talk of a ferry across service in the county ended.

In 1958 only two trains a day ran from Camden to Wildwood, a far cry from around 1924 when the Reading Railroad had opened the Camden terminal to facilitate seashore service and connect the railroad with the Delaware River ferry.

In early 1973 all passenger service to Wildwood was terminated, but because the country was in the midst of a gas shortage, service was restored on a reduced basis. Three years later all train
