

I.N. Griscom, sales manager for Frank J Pedrick & Son, appealed to area realtors in August of 1925 for assistance in selling the properties. As the Wildwood Gables project began, the Bader Construction Company was bringing in 15 carloads by train of supplies, but unforeseen tragic events were about to occur. Prior to the Depression Frank J Pedrick & Son lost money and land so future communities, including Wildwood Gables, were halted. Unfortunately, then came the bankruptcy proceedings.

Brief Bio of Frank J Pedrick

Franklin Jones Pedrick was born to Charlotte E Jones & Charles P Pedrick in 1869 in Little Egg Harbor, NJ. At the age of 14 Frank moved to Atlantic City to be a carpenter's apprentice. He trained as a journeyman and then worked as a subcontractor on John Young's Million Dollar Pier in 1910 in AC. Two sons, Leonard Frank and William Alfred joined their father in real estate development after serving in the US Navy. In 1919 the contracting business began developing huge projects of moderate housing in Atlantic City, Chelsea, Ventnor and Margate, including Chelsea Baptist Church (1917), Winchester Gardens and Marven Gardens, included on the Monopoly board game. Frank J Pedrick was about 66 years old when he died in 1935 of uremic poisoning, a kidney problem. He was buried at Atlantic City Cemetery in Pleasantville, NJ. After the dissolution of the realty business, Leonard became a banker in Philadelphia and William was a life insurance agent in NYC.


Why the Spanish style?

Maybe, like a serpentine rally of dominoes, one thing may have triggered the

-When Spanish colonists settled in Florida, southern California, and Mexico, after the invasions of the Spanish Empire,

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they constructed buildings similar to those in their homeland.



-At the completion of the Panama Canal in 1914, San Diego hosted the Panama California Exposition for 2 years, 1915-16. Many of the pavilions featured Spanish architecture which

impressed President Theodore Roosevelt. He pleaded:" I hope that not only will you keep these buildings running for another year, but you will keep these buildings of rare, phenomenal taste and beauty permanently."

-Following the exposition, there was a revival of the Spanish Colonial architectural style in the nation. It was the trend for many of the planned communities in southern California and Florida.

Some unanswered questions...

*How many Pedrick homes were actually built in Wildwood Gables before the collapse of the project and how many remain?

*Were all the Gables homes to be built by Frank J Pedrick & Son or who were the other builders? Ben Schlenzig, a carpenter, was said to have built some Spanish style houses.

Many Spanish style houses in Wildwood Crest are 'Home' a hundred years later.

Wildwood Historical Society's Coronavirus Protocols

The Wildwood Historical Society and George Boyer Museum are dedicated to the safety of our staff, volunteers and patrons. Therefore, we will take the following measures to combat the spread of COVID-19:

- Hand sanitizer and tissues are available at the front desk. Hand soap and paper towels, as always, are available in the restroom.
- •All persons who enter the museum are required to wear a face covering. This includes staff, volunteers and patrons.


