# Taylor Fish Co.

John Ogden Taylor (1867-1934) was one of the first commercial fisherman to ship fish from Wildwood and also one of the first of the fishermen to use pounds. At that time, it was necessary to obtain licenses from the War Department to operate these traps.

They were constructed with stakes which were about 75 to 80 feet long. The stakes were drug by horses to the beach, across the sand and into the water; then taken to the shoals where they were driven to the bottom. Nets were fastened between the poles to trap and hold the fish. Itemized reports of the amount of each kind of fish caught each

month, had to be sent to the Bureau of Fisheries. The pounds had to be dismantled during WW II since the enemy submarines could use them as markers.

The Wildwood Historical Society is fortunate to have one of the last two Taylor Fish Company boxes here at the museum thanks to Lois Ann Taylor from North Fort Myers, Florida. Mrs. Taylor also sent us a ship's compass from that time and a collection of photos of the pound fishermen at work. If you have an interest in this part of Wildwood history, stop in to take a look. *Thank you Mrs. Taylor!*



George F. Bover 1904 - 1976

George F. Boyer's name appears on our museum. but who was the man?

As we celebrate the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the George F. Boyer Museum, we recall the legacy of the man who founded it.

George Frederick Boyer was born in Philadelphia on September 6, 1904, the son of a fireman and a homemaker. Around 1932, while

Founded by Boyer, Wildwood's first historical museum opened in 1963, on the 2<sup>nd</sup> floor of the Municipal Building; six months later a Library of New Jersey History was

In addition to collecting artifacts and curating the museum and library, Boyer penned several books and numerous magazine and newspaper stories about the history of Wildwood and the surrounding area. Cape May County Story, coauthored with J. Pearson Cunningham, was published in 1975, followed by



a solo effort, Wildwood: Middle of the Island. in 1976. He was also a motivating factor in helping to have a Wildwood landmark—the first school building in Holly Beach City, known as the Mini Housepreserved in Holly Beach Park.

In October 1976, the City of Wildwood honored Boyer for his "long and devoted service" by renaming the museum the George F. Boyer Historical Museum. He passed away a month later, but his legacy lives on. The museum continues to welcome visitors and locals alike, just as it did a half-century ago under Bover's care.
