Some time ago, we were given back issues of *SHOUT* magazine, a seasonal publication that showcased the entertainment on the is-



New Acquisitions

The staff here at the museum has been busy, gathering, preserving and presenting various artifacts throughout the summer months. **Mike Stafford** of the Sea Isle City museum gave us a collection of aerial photos of North Wildwood taken in August, of 2009, before the dunes were erected. **Chris White**, a frequent, visitor brought us some very old Wildwood souvenir pennants. Old menus from the S. A. Wade Tavern and The Lodge Restaurant came to us from **Joe Duncan**. Our own, **Bob Scully**, brought in several issues of "Ship Ahoy," the WHS yearbook from the 1930s. He also brought in photos going back to the 1920s. **Dom Capacchione** gave us photos of the Boardwalk fire of December 17, 1991, while **Dave McVey** gave us a collection of photos of the fishing vessel *Irma Pauline* along with newspaper clippings. They can be found in our *Fishing Industry -Otten's Harbor Book*.

One day a gentleman by the name of **Charles F. Leiby, IV,** from Absecon, came into our museum and gave us an unusual collection. It consisted of medals belonging to the first fire chief, Wilbur W. Washburn. Also patents that Washburn had applied for, for boring, and a cutting and punching shingle machine. We also have a photo of Washburn demonstrating the shingle cutting machine. **Ayne Zaberer** of Zaberer's Restaurant fame sent us a collection of news articles and photos from the restaurant. Mrs. Zaberer now resides in Florida. **Diane Benero Copeland** who currently resides in California sent us a collection of photos taken in Wildwood and North Wildwood, in 1997, before the building boom. **Sharon Jolly** donated two books, *Great Storms of the Jersey Shore* and *Jersey Diners*. They are here for your perusal.

Our faithful volunteer, **Inge Friesenborg Laine** gave us a box of slides from the Hunt's Boardwalk fire of August, 1981, and a collection of old bottles. **Tom Bradshaw** sent in a Polk Directory from 1967, that lists residents and businesses on the entire island. **Pat Carty** sent us a "brand new old shirt" with the Corson's Men's Shop label in excellent shape, and a Sellright Beverage promotional booklet from years ago. **Pary Lion Woehlcke** (WCHS, '64) gave us *Annscript* yearbooks from the early 60s, plus a great collection of photos and artifacts from her family, which we were happy to receive.

There you have it, and the list is by no means limited to the above acquisitions. You'll just have to come in and check us out.



Old Boardwalk Amusements

In our last issue I asked readers if they remembered a "dark ride" called "The Mystery Castle." I received very few letters, but everyone seemed to remember the castle for the same things.

Charles Carr (WHS '57) wrote, "You asked about the Mystery Castle. I knew it well. It was the cheapest thing on the Boardwalk and seldom changed. Why we went in so often. I can't imagine. It had the distorting mirrors and the air jets. I used to take our family friends from Western Pennsylvania on the Boardwalk and we always went through the castle. There were 5 kids and they thought it was funny that I knew the secret of getting through. By following the wall you didn't get lost. After the room in the center, then you went back out another way. While you went through there was the roar of the roller coaster that went overhead as it did the Old Mill."

From Elaine Penkethman Gardiner (WHS '59): "I had forgotten all about this amusement until I saw

your call for comments on it. I went through it many times as a child. Though my memories of the scary figures and such that one encountered in the castle are vague, I do have two dear memories. The first is the crazy mirror room. Great fun! The second is of a walkway, I think as we were exiting, where a wind machine blew one's skirt up—a la Marilyn Monroe in that famous photo."

Jack Beaver (WHS '57) wrote that he remembered "there was a lighted room in the middle and port-

holes to look in like shadowboxes." He also mentioned "the mirrors that reflected your image in strange shapes as well as air jets that blew the ladies' skirts up."

There you have it, memories of the Boardwalk. My own personal memory was a harrowing experience. I had the "stay close to the wall" down pat so you didn't get disoriented, until my Uncle Al took me on the amusement. Somehow I got turned around, got lost, and started to scream and cry. The more I yelled, the more he laughed. until the amusement attendant had to open a side door and let me out. Good thing Uncle Al was a favorite of mine. I could never have forgiven him otherwise.

At left is the amusement ride "Ye Old Mill.," mentioned by Charles Carr. It was a boat ride through a dark tunnel and sometimes referred to as "The tunnel of love." I can't recall what scenes were available in the tunnel, but it did exist for quite a while under the roller coaster or the "Jack Rabbit".
